What Did Seurat Create?

Georges Seurat invented a new way of painting called **Pointillism**, where pictures are made using tiny dots of colour. Instead of mixing colours on a palette, he placed small dots side by side and let the viewer's eyes mix them! His art is calm, detailed, and full of light.



Childhood

- Georges was born in Paris, France in 1859.
- His family was wealthy, so he didn't have to worry about money.
- He loved drawing from a young age.
- He had a quiet personality and spent lots of time observing and sketching.

Education

- He studied at the École des Beaux-Arts, a famous art school in Paris.
- He also learned by visiting museums and copying famous paintings.
- He was inspired by **science** and how light and colour work.
- He admired artists like **Delacroix** and the **Impressionists**.

Career


- Seurat invented **Pointillism**, a new art style using only tiny dots.

- He believed art should be scientific and carefully planned.
- He died young, at age **31**, but left a big mark on modern art.
