#### Who is J.M.W. Turner?

Joseph Mallord William Turner was a British artist known for painting powerful landscapes, stormy seas, and glowing skies. He used soft colours and swirling brushstrokes to show light, weather, and movement. Some of his paintings look almost like dreams!

Turner is famous for painting the feeling of a place — not just what it looks like, but what it feels like to be there.

# Step 1: Lightly Sketch the Composition

#### What to do:

- 1. Use a pencil or diluted paint to *lightly sketch the basic layout* of the scene onto your canvas.
- 2. Mark the **horizon line** about one-third from the bottom.
- 3. Lightly outline the large ghostly sailing ship (The Temeraire) to the left, the small black tugboat pulling it, and the setting sun low on the right side of the canvas.
- 4. Sketch distant ships and reflections very lightly for later detailing.



# Step 2: Block in the Background Sky and Water

#### What to do:

- 1. Mix **soft tones** of yellow, peach, rose pink, lavender, and pale blue.
- 2. Using a large flat brush, start applying these colours to the **sky** in broad, sweeping strokes, working from the **top down** to create a glowing sunset effect.
- 3. Blend gently to give a misty, atmospheric look.
- 4. Use the same colours reflected lightly in the **water below**, but horizontally—keep strokes soft and horizontal to capture the reflection.
- 5. Leave the ships and sun areas mostly blank for now.

**Tip:** Use a dry brush or a soft rag to **gently blur transitions** between colours, just like Turner's hazy, glowing skies.



## Step 3: Highlight the Sun and Its Glow

#### What to do:

- 1. Mix a **bright warm orange** with a touch of red and white.
- 2. Using a **small round brush**, paint the **sun** as a glowing orb near the horizon on the right side.
- 3. Gently blend **around the sun** in circular strokes using more **white**, **yellow**, **and pale orange** to create a radiant halo.
- 4. With a dry brush or your finger, softly **smudge the edges** of the glow into the sky and water to mimic Turner's diffused light effect.
- 5. Add a faint vertical reflection of the sun in the water directly below it.

**Tip:** Keep the sun soft — avoid sharp outlines. It should feel like it's glowing through mist.



# Step 4: Paint the Tugboat and Steam

### What to do:

- 1. Mix dark browns, blacks, and greys to paint the small steam tugboat on the left side of the painting.
- 2. Use a small brush to block in the **body of the boat**, keeping the shape compact and low in the water.
- 3. Add the **steam funnel** rising upward and blend **dark smoke** trailing back through the sky.
- 4. Lightly feather the smoke into the background using a dry brush to create a misty effect.

5. Add **soft reflections** of the boat and smoke into the water directly beneath it.

**Tip:** Make the tugboat stand out by using more defined lines than the surrounding scene — Turner used it as a symbol of modern industrial power.



# Step 5: Paint the Sailing Ship (The Temeraire)

#### What to do:

- 1. Mix **muted golden browns, creams, and greys** to capture the ghostly tone of the old warship.
- 2. Using a fine brush, paint the **masts and rigging** first keep them faint and hazy to match Turner's ethereal look.
- 3. Then paint the **body of the ship**: long, tall, and slightly translucent, making it appear as if it's fading into the mist.
- 4. Add just a **hint of light on the edges**, using pale white or soft yellow, to suggest where the setting sun touches the ship.
- 5. Lightly blend reflections in the water beneath the hull.

**Tip:** Use a soft touch and feathered edges — the Temeraire should feel majestic but fading, almost like a memory.



# Step 6: Add Distant Boats and Final Reflections

## What to do:

- 1. Mix dark browns, blacks, and greys to sharpen and contrast different elements in the painting
- 2. Use a small brush to define the small boat and the buoy.
